What are you doing with your SPARE ROOM?

According to the latest government statistics there are over 66,000 households in Brighton & Hove with one or more spare bedroom.

Whilst many people stepped forward to host Ukrainians when war broke out, a much smaller proportion are joining the lesser known Sussex Nightstop movement - a growing network based in Brighton that offers a community response to the growing problem of youth homelessness.

A logical solution, Sussex Nightstop utilises spare rooms for short stays, supporting young people experiencing homelessness while they get back on their feet. Service co-ordinators connect them with local services and support their housing planning, working towards a safe, sustainable home, while hosts provide welcoming overnight accommodation. Excellent training and management is key to Nightstop's success – and avoids the issues reported by newspapers around some hosts feeling unsupported by the Ukranian scheme.

"We don't expect hosts to make any arrangements – that's our job" say H, Tom and Mitchelle, Sussex Nightstop's service team. "All we ask for is a warm welcome, a spare room, access to a shower and washing machine, an evening meal, breakfast and a packed lunch, for which the service pays expenses. Guests typically stay for 4-7 nights with each host but it's a flexible service that our hosts can easily

incorporate into a normal evening at home. We also provide training and ongoing support to hosts, so they're never alone."



Hosts Liz and Patrick had always thought they should use their spare rooms when their kids

left home. "We liked the flexibility of Nightstop as it fits our lives and works around the host. I think we need to address the caricature that is a homeless



person... and instead see the young person for who they are. Many are studying or working in Brighton & Hove. If one of our family became homeless, we'd want someone looking out for them and that's what we're here to do."

Rita is a busy GP who also plays in a band, so her time is very much in demand: "My house is a resource and I like helping people. I've enjoyed every single person who's stayed. I don't know why more people don't do it... it's just not hard!"



There's something rather special about this service. It reminds people at the most desperate of times that people care, which builds confidence and belief - vital ingredients in a young person's ability to maintain the good stuff in their life, seize new opportunities and bring about positive change for themselves.

Rottingdean library is staffed (usually by Anne who is super helpful and kind) on Mondays and Wednesdays and at other times your Libraries Extra card means you have full access to the library and books. riginally a Flower Show at St Aubyns, it moved to The Elms Garden where dainty tea tables were hosted by the Girls Club, dressed in long floral dresses with puffed sleeves and poke bonnets. Opened in 1925 by Lucy Baldwin, wife of the Prime Minister, it raised £392 for the school, church and windmill restoration. Pump Green had a track beside the pond, where Mr Hilder nightly gathered in the ducks for fear of the fox. Here, a beer stall was set up and young farmers would shimmy a greasy pole to claim a prize.

So the annual fair was born! 25 years ago I started decorating the guest speaker podium with artworks helped by local children from the Whiteway Centre to echo the themed cavalcade by Winifred Hoyle, a theatrical costumier.

Elizabeth Taylor wrote good wishes for our fair to Marcus Bagshaw, then Grange Museum curator, with fond memories of our village when filming for Enid Bagnold's 'National Velvet'.

With so many tales of actors, writers and artists who graced our village, we also remember passed organisers Peter and Margarey Hampton, Harold Williams, Hilary Feltham of the W.I and artwork contributors Mike Jerrome and Mick Bensley. In hand drawing this year's poster, I hope I have captured that boundless energy of community spirit.

Rottingdean Dental Care has been established 42 years. During this time, we have become more aware of the harmful effects of smoking.

Most people know that smoking is bad for your health, causing deadly diseases such as lung cancer, heart disease and strokes etc. While these health risks grab all the headlines, many people still don't know the serious effects smoking has on your oral health.

1. Mouth Cancer

According to the NHS, more than 93% of cancers (in the gullet part of the throat) are caused by smoking, and if you smoke you are 6 times more likely to develop mouth cancer than non-smokers. The odds also rise when combined with alcohol. However, if you stop smoking your risk of cancer begins to decrease even if you have been a heavy smoker. 2. Risk of Gum Disease

Smoking causes lack of oxygen to the blood stream, so infected gums do not heal. This then accelerates the effects of gum disease, which can also lead to the loss of a tooth.

3. Tooth Loss

Smoking is a major contributory factor to tooth loss. Smoking worsens the effect of gum disease and if left untreated, the bone in your jaw may be damaged and small spaces can open up between the gum and teeth resulting in them becoming loose and falling out.

4. Bad Breath

Its not surprising that bad breath occurs in smokers, as over 4000 chemicals pass through your oral cavity each time you smoke and many of them end up collecting on the surfaces inside your mouth. Smoking can also contribute to bad breath by drying out the mouth.

5. Stained Teeth

PAST LIVES

WILLIAM SAXBY: GRAVE 5019

This is the grave of William Saxby who lived from 1837 to 1893 and of his wife Fanny Saxby who died in 1901. He left £770 to her in his will.



William Saxby lived with his family at Court House, one of the four farms in Rottingdean, the other three being West Side Farm at Hillside, Challoners Farm at Challoners and East Side Farm based at Down House. The house was originally built by Nicholas Beard around 1745 and passed through several hands before being sold in 1824 with William Saxby as the tenant. Court House was the Farmhouse for Court Farm whose barns formed the basis of Tudor Close.

William farmed 730 acres and employed 24 men and 9 boys according to the 1871 census. This also listed two sons, two daughters and four servants: a cook from Alfriston, a nurse from Dublin and two housemaids.

His next door neighbour was Steyning Beard at Down House, who farmed 550 acres which employed 28 men and 8 boys according to the 1871 census. This also listed a nursemaid, a cook and a housemaid. They came from as far afield as Norfolk, Shropshire and lersey.

Both Court House and Down House were re fronted with squared knapped flints. This was a sign of wealth





this way. It did produce a fairly maintenance free frontage as there was hardly any mortar exposed to erosion by the elements.

FRIENDS OF KIPLING GARDENS

The have had a very positive first half of 2025. The winter and spring weather delivered just the right amount of moisture and warmth. The more delicate species overwintered well. We then had an abundance of spring blossom which will hopefully lead to plenty of fruit on our medlar, quince and ornamental cherry trees.





Some enthusiastic new volunteers have joined the group and together with our sharpened tools (thank you Andrew Clark) this is making the task of maintaining and developing the gardens rather easier. Visitor numbers also appear to be increasing, no doubt helped by the gardens being very highly rated on both trip advisor and google maps.

Our next development will be to make raised beds (using recycled timber) and for these to go into gaps in the existing herb garden. We will then plant some attractive but edible varieties of ornamental courgettes, borlotti beans, red chard and a greater range of herbs.

Quite remarkably it has been great to see that the tree vandalised by bark stripping a couple of years ago still seems healthy and has not only come into leaf again this year but is also growing new bark.

FRIENDS OF BEACON HILL

e were very fortunate with the spring weather and continued our hard work removing bramble, hawthorn and blackthorn roots from the area on the north-eastern side of the hill which was mown last year. We hope this will keep the scrub which has encroached on the area in recent years under control, allowing sheep to safely graze the area and native wild chalkland flowers to re-establish themselves.

We were pleased to discover the first cowslips (Primula veris) flowering at our first April workday. Hopefully orchids will follow them as we move into summer. As we worked, we were serenaded by skylarks soaring overhead. We are lucky to have a relatively healthy population. They are ground nesting birds and the nests can be easily disturbed or damaged, so it is important to remain on the designated



footpaths on the hill and not let dogs run into the grass, thus ensuring they can continue to breed here safely to delight us.



NEVILL ROAD PARKING

Residents on the private unadopted section of Nevill Road in Rottingdean will implement new parking restrictions from early summer. It follows persistent road blockages that have prevented access by fire, ambulance and other emergency services to their homes.

The private unadopted section runs to the top of the hill from the side of The Bistro Gourmand and the entrance to the Royal Mail depot. Through the Nevill Road Residents Association, which oversees its upkeep, the residents have consulted on their solution with Brighton & Hove Council, Rottingdean Parish Council, the local Member of Parliament and the emergency services, as well as neighbouring businesses including Royal Mail also affected by inconsiderate parking.

The new measures are expected to come into force by June. These will include double yellow lines and designated permit-only parking bays. A private contractor will manage the restrictions through camera technology and levy a penalty on drivers breaching them. It is important to note that blue badge holders will not be exempt, as this is private land.

The NRRA stresses that these measures do not affect the road's status as a bridle path and right of way for walkers and cyclists. Indeed, they should improve safety for all.
