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ACTING ON YOUTH HOMELESSNESS



Tim Williamson is chair of the Board of Trustees at Sussex Nightstop. A logical and straightforward way to support young people experiencing homelessness, this Brighton-based charity places young people in volunteer host homes for short overnight stays.

"My wife and I have hosted for eight years now and we get a lot out of it. It's rewarding, supporting young people through a rough patch so they can go on to flourish in our community. Both of us have busy working lives, but the beauty of volunteering with Nightstop is that you are in control. You can host when it suits you. Some people worry about safety, but Nightstop is seamlessly managed. In all our time hosting, we've had no incidents at all—just lovely young people in need of a little bit of help. I'd urge anyone living in Brighton & Hove who has a spare room to consider joining this very logical, kind and human solution to a growing problem."

Volunteer hosts receive excellent training and support, which includes an on-call team to cover nights when the office is closed. Expenses are covered and volunteers pick their hosting nights to suit their schedule. Some volunteers prefer to host for a few days and others like to commit to a week-long placement, to give the young person a smoother stay.

Figures from Centrepoint show a 12% increase in young people facing homelessness in 2023/4. Brighton is a hotspot, linked to high rental costs, among many other factors like zero hours contracts and the cost of living.

URGENT CALL FOR VOLUNTEERS

If you or someone you know lives in Brighton & Hove and has a spare room, they could be part of Sussex Nightstop's community response to youth homelessness. The charity needs more volunteers to host young people aged 16-25 for short stays (3 -7 days) whilst homeless and working towards a new home.



Clare and David have hosted with Nightstop for seven years and live in Hove. Clare volunteers for Nightstop among other local charities. "Hosting opens your eyes to the different lives out there. You never know who's coming and whether you'll get on, but we no longer worry about that as all our experiences have been good. The support is brilliant and you never feel on your own. It's great that the Nightstop service works so quickly.... people aren't in the service for long and the best thing is when a guest tells you they're getting the keys to their new home."

Sussex Nightstop needs more hosts and community champions, as the cost-of-living crisis and high rents in the city continues.

he main topic of conversation over the summer months has been the possibility of the library closing. By the time this goes to print, we will hopefully know more, but Rottingdean Heritage has voiced serious concerns. Our charitable aims include protecting local culture and heritage,



and the closure would not only deprive residents of a much-loved and well-used resource but could also put the future of the Grange Gallery and Museum at risk.

These spaces, leased by Rottingdean Heritage from Brighton & Hove City Council (BHCC), partly depend on the library's footfall and the shared use of the building. Despite the uncertainty, under the terms of our lease, BHCC cannot evict Rottingdean Heritage before 2030. This ensures the Gallery and Museum will remain open as a cultural attraction for both residents and visitors in the coming years. Rottingdean Heritage, however, remains firmly committed to working alongside others to secure the library's future and safeguard this important community hub.

In other news, it has been another busy summer season for Rottingdean Heritage. Our Gallery Director, Dimitrios Evangelou, presented a wonderful exhibition of Edward Burne-Jones's The Flower Book, and the Wilde Volk exhibition at the Windmill attracted over 1,000 visitors in just two days! The PO has been advised by BHCC planning that these need planning permission.

RECYCLING

You can now put the following items in your black recycling bin. Please clean them and take off any plastic film.

- Plastic pots used for yoghurt, prepared fruit, mini desserts, soup and cosmetics (such as skin cream and hair gel)
- Plastic tubs that contained margarine, chocolate, pasta sauces, ice cream, baked goods, such as bite-sized flapjacks, and laundry powder
- Plastic trays or bowls these include meat and fish trays, ready-meal bowls or trays, snack and salad containers, fruit punnets, containers for fresh or prepared vegetables as well as cakes and pastries, also trays used inside boxes of chocolates

UNDERCLIFF SAFETY CAMPAIGN.

We recently met with BHCC, RPC and the owners of Molly's and Ovingdean café. As a result, share the space signage is going to be refreshed and rumble strips will be laid by the cafes which will hopefully slow cyclists down and make them aware they are in a busy area.

SEAWATER AND SEDIMENT TESTING.

FORCE is looking to rollout testing our local seawater for pollution and sediment from the marina. Its' ultimate goal is to secure Blue Flag status for Rottingdean beach following its Bathing Beach status achieved last year.


Finally, a big Congratulations and Thank You to RPC, and all the other volunteers, who have worked so hard to bring us the new community field.

PAST LIVES

NURSES: 1. ZOE DOUET GRAVE 7049

You have probably heard about the Windrush generation. This was a group of Caribbean workers who arrived in England during the fifties and sixties which was a post war period marked by labour shortages. Many of them became the backbone of our transport, health, and other essential public services. However, Brighton residents were benefitting from West Indian carers in our hospitals some fifty years before!

Zoe Douet was born in 1873 in South London to Jamaican parents. Her father was a Principal in the Inland Revenue. In 1881 they had one servant. By the 1901 census they were prospering as



they had moved to Epsom employing a cook and a maid. Sadly, her mother Sophia had died, and her father had remarried so she now had a stepmother, Henrietta, a woman from Kent.

As the register of nurses shows she trained at the Royal Sussex County Hospital from 1904 to 1907 and was still nursing there in 1925 only a year before her death.

She died at her home in Nevill Road in 1926 and left over £2,000 in her will.

NURSES: 2. JULIA EDWARDS GRAVE NO 6202

The above grave is inscribed "Nurse JULIA EDWARDS for 22 years a faithful friend and helper at St Aubyns School." She died on 9th January 1918, aged 65 years.

She had been with St Aubyns school since it was opened by Mr Stanford in 1895. One of four matrons by 1911, Nurse Edwards ran The Cottage which was used as a sanatorium. She is said to have been an old-fashioned nurse who doled out the castor oil in generous quantities.

Despite all the healthy sports the boys were often affected by contagious illnesses. For this reason, there was a footbridge over the twitten which linked the school and the field. This was to reduce the risk of catching infectious diseases from the village children.

COMMUNITY LIBRARY REVIEW

Following the review of Brighton and Hove community libraries, on the 17th of July BHCC Councillors agreed to consult on the closure of three libraries, including Rottingdean. A 12-week consultation is underway ending on the 10th of October that will include a drop-in session at the library on the 9th of September. A decision on the closure will be made in December. The Parish Council is very concerned that these proposals include the recommendation to close the Rottingdean Library and understands its importance and strong feeling to the community for all residents. not only as a place to borrow books but also as a community hub sited within walking distance of two schools and two churches. We are committed to ensuring that residents' views are clearly and effectively communicated to BHCC officers and Councillors throughout the consultation process. We strongly encourage all residents to respond to the consultation and attend public meetings, where they can share their views directly with BHCC officers and Councillors. The Parish Council will continue to be actively involved with the community during the consultation process and our formal response to the consultation will be available on our website.

MAJOR PROJECTS

St Aubyns. We are delighted to confirm that the former St Aubyns Field, Chapel and Pavilion has now been acquired by Rottingdean Parish Council (RPC) from Fairfax Properties. An opening event was held on the 28th of June with around 250 people in attendance. The ceremony included the return of the former school colours from St Margaret's Church to the Chapel handed over by Father Martin (former Parish Priest at St Margaret's) to Tim Prideaux, Chair of the St Aubyns Alumni. The future use of the Chapel and the Pavilion has yet to be decided but will bring additional community facilities for generations to come.

High Street. Repair of the High Street road and pavements remains a key priority. The working group set up with the local Ward Councillors to address both resurfacing and pedestrian safety met with BHCC senior engineers on the 17th of July. A plan for a traffic management study was agreed that will model the impact of options to reduce traffic flow through Rottingdean. The Study is schedule to report by the end of the year. The group also discussed BHCC proposals for the repair of the pavement and road surface subject to available funding. Further updates will be available on our Website.

VILLAGE AMENITIES

Repair of the Pond Barrier. The pond barrier has now been fully repaired and painted

Damage to the Kipling Garden's rear wall. We are continuing to press BHCC to pursue advice from Sussex Police regarding the possibility of making an insurance claim. Once this has been confirmed, the Parish Council and BHCC will be able to decide how the repair costs will be met.

Cllr Nixon is to meet with Jess Gibbons and senior members of her team on Tuesday the 5th of August. The discussion will include the Community Library review, progress on the High Street and the repair of Kipling Gardens Wall.

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
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• SAVE ROTTINGDEAN LIBRARY! •

o cut spending, Brighton and Hove City Council is proposing to close Rottingdean, Westdene and Hollingbury Libraries and reduce opening hours elsewhere. If this goes ahead, Rottingdean Library will close for good in April 2026. It will be gone forever, a black day for the village, the result of a stupid, reckless and ill-informed decision based on the Council's deeply flawed 'needs analysis'. This will keep the least used libraries in the city open as present while closing the second most used (Rottingdean Library) and reducing hours at the most used (Jubilee).

In the rushed consultation process (due to last until October 10th), it is already evident that the needs of the village have been completely misjudged by the Council. According to its analysis, schoolchildren, the elderly and disabled, and the many other people who use Rottingdean library, are insufficiently deserving compared to others elsewhere.

The fact that there are two primary schools within 2 minutes and Longhill Secondary within 10 minutes' walk, seems to have been ignored. To take away this resource from our schoolkids will have detrimental effects on their literacy skills, leave them even more prey to social media, and adversely affect their futures in a city which has one of the worst records in the country for youth educational and employment outcomes.

The elderly and disabled are similarly dismissed. Because of the high level of car ownership and bus links along the coast, it is assumed that these groups will either drive or get the bus to another library. This takes no account of whether the elderly and disabled are indeed all car drivers, or if they can easily use the bus service, or would be able to walk the 4+mile round trip to Saltdean and back.

Yes, it's outrageous, it's unfair, so make your views known! Join the library if not already a member, sign the petition, join the campaign, voice your concerns at the consultation events, to your Councillors and your MP. Make a noise! Website Save Rottingdean Library, has all the information you need. My thanks to Clive Bonny and others for their invaluable input.



JOURNEYS WITH TEXTILES

y third and last 'Personal Journeys with Textiles' exhibitions at the Grange Gallery marks the conclusion of my voyage: in the 50s, taught practical textile skills by my mother; in the 70s, inspired by the wave of innovative knitting; in the 80s and 90s, picking up textiles in local markets abroad; finally undertaking PhD research with a group of Bedouin women weavers.

In retirement I resumed hand knitting and researching. Moving to Rottingdean in 2017, I was encouraged to think about a textile exhibition, as the Grange Gallery has showcased Arts and Craft supporters. One exhibition led to another: 2019, Textiles reflecting designs in other cultures; 2023 Textiles as handwoven jackets linked with traditions worldwide; and for this 2025 exhibition Waistcoats as Textile samplers, wearable today.

I have learnt how patchwork and squares are a successful way of displaying the range of techniques. And, as with so many worldwide rugs and textiles, repeated and contrasting patterns are a way of eliciting an emotional response, This exhibition is also a thank you to all those who have helped in my textile journey and especially to Rottingdean, an inspiration for showing textiles as Art as well as Craft. **Sue Jones**

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

Summer on a sunny day is a lovely time of year on Beacon Hill. The grass is tall, many species of plants are flowering, and this year there seem to be plenty of insects about. One plant which we have noticed more frequently in recent years especially on the village side of the hill is common ragwort (Jacobaea vulgaris). Ragwort contains potent toxins which can cause liver failure in grazing animals (especially in young animals), including horses, ponies, donkeys, deer and cattle, although sheep appear to eat it without apparent injury. It is also quite invasive; a single plant can produce up to



200,000 seeds which can lay dormant in the soil for as long as 20 years.

However, it is a wonderful plant for wildlife. At least 30 insect and 14 fungi species live on nothing else, and about one third of those are nationally scarce or rare. Probably the most familiar insect associated with ragwort is the Cinnabar Moth, a striking black and red moth often disturbed from the low vegetation on which it spends the day. The black and gold caterpillars of this moth gorge themselves on ragwort, starting off by eating the developing seeds before moving onto the leaves. If in sufficient numbers, Cinnabar Moth caterpillars make effective biological control, as they eat all parts of the plant. We have been removing some plants in areas on the hill where it is becoming dominant whilst leaving sufficient to support wildlife.

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
